Background about the Crystal Palace, the worlds first theme park

On 30 November 1936 fire destroyed the Crystal Palace which dominated the Norwood Heights for eight decades. The palace moved from Hyde Park to what is now Upper Norwood in 1854 following the Great Exhibition and was rebuilt bigger than ever. In fact it was;

Three times bigger than St Pauls' Cathedral

Had exhibition space equivalent to 6 full size football pitches

Nelsons' Column in Trafalgar Square could fit in the middle of the palace

Antenna Tower

Sports Centre.

Crystal Palace Train Station

When it opened in 1854 it became the world's first theme park offering education, entertainment, even a **rollercoaster** and a **waterpark**. Imagine Disneyland but instead of *Pirates of the Caribbean* and Mickey Mouse's castle, they built from scratch the **inside of a Roman villa** from Pompeii, built a replica of an **ancient Egyptian tomb** complete with statues of Rameses made out of plaster cast, and the **Nineveh Court** bringing back to life palaces of the kings of Assyria lost to the desert. This was long before TV so most people would have no idea what the past looked like.

WHAT DID THEY SHOW AT THE 'EIGHTH WONDER OF THE WORLD'?

Millions of visitors every year flocked from around the world to visit 'the people's palace', including Queen Victoria. They came to see exhibitions and events like;

- The worlds' first flying machines in 1868
- The world's first cat show in 1871
- The first FA Cup Finals between 1895 and 1914 (until Wembley Stadium was built)
- The first motor show, followed in later years by motor racing around the grounds
- Spectacular fireworks every week re-enacting sea battles like the Battle of Trafalgar
- Concerts performed by 5,000 singers and 500 musicians
- Giant models of **dinosaurs** built only 30 years after the first fossils were found.
- **Daredevils** like aerialist Blondin who pushed a lion in a wheelbarrow across a tightrope, and Leona Dare who rose 2,000 ft into the sky holding onto a hot air balloon with her teeth
- A giant Redwood Tree called 'Big Stump' towering inside the building
- Nadia's hot air balloon inside lifting up visitors to the roof of the palace
- A School of Music and a School of Engineering training students in the arts and science
- The earliest TV transmissions from the studios of television pioneer John Loggie Baird

Top Tips for writing about YOUR Crystal Palace

The Crystal Palace was huge so your ideas can be VERY BIG or teeny weeny.

Wondering how to start your story?

Maybe you want to begin on the day of your grand opening, then the Queen arrives and you proudly show her what you have in YOUR Crystal Palace.

Or perhaps it could be the day before it opens and you're busy getting everything ready (is it going well? Are you stressed? Excited?)

Or feel free to kick off your story how you want – after all, this is YOUR Crystal Palace!
